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BIRTH OF THE 'RAINBOW COUNTRY'

Neither bombs nor the weather and the long hours of waiting could deter millions of South Africans of all colours from casting their votes, most of them for the first time.

A Russian election monitor said to us, 'What has happened here is a miracle.' No one could have foreseen Kenyan Professor Washington Okumu's friendship with Chief Buthelezi leading to the latter's agreeing to take part in the elections, or the effect of a white prison warder's care for Nelson Mandela.

The election has been a release for black South Africans from years of oppression and for many white South Africans it has been a release from the guilt of the past. People are enthusiastic because it is now OUR country. The 'rainbow country' has come to birth.

Ken Owen, Editor of the *Sunday Times*, said, 'Few expected us to succeed, nobody expected such a spectacularly uneventful transition, but, then, we are richly blessed in hope and faith.'

'Reconciliation is our greatest collective priority,' says Professor Willie Esterhuysen from Stellenbosch University. 'Guilt and forgiveness for what has happened must be accepted. The miracle ... is that the majority of people are seeking reconciliation.' A retired headmaster from Cape Town, Pat Sonn, reinforces this point: 'The Holy Spirit is at work. Faith brought reconciliation. The backing of the rest of the world is imperative.'

God has honoured the prayers of many from around the world. They have brought us through this time of profound change, the manner of which has helped to begin healing, to restore dignity and to lay a sound foundation for the future South Africa. President Mandela's message has been one of reconciliation and no recrimination; the heartaches of the past are real but now we need to leave the past behind and plan for the future. Deputy President de Klerk has been graceful in defeat as President Mandela has been magnanimous in victory. We are fortunate to have had two such leaders at this stage of our development.

Now that the celebrations are over, our real work starts - to heal the scars of the past, and build trust and respect between people and parties. There is also the need to address the urgent basic issues of conservation, water distribution, land use, housing, education, improved health care and job creation for the 50 per cent who are unemployed. We need to

build a land where our children can walk tall and grow strong and our elderly can live and die with a sense of peace and security. We also need to look outward to our role in Africa and the rest of the world. We would appreciate your continuing prayers.

We concluded that at the end of the day what counts is the territory in the world ruled by the Holy Spirit, and in the conquest of this each person counts.

KIEV STUDENTS ORGANISE SEMINAR

Edward Peters and I visited Kiev in April as guests of the University of Kiev-Mohyla Academy student brotherhood. We were joined there by Frantz Nielsen and Julie Wilhelmsen from Norway and Fanie du Toit, a South African Rhodes scholar from Oxford, for a seminar on the theme 'Cooperation for Changes', organised by the students.

After the seminar Edward and I stayed on to establish the process of selecting the 12 Ukrainian politicians who will visit Britain from 11-25 November. The British Embassy is giving full cooperation to this venture. Also, on the introduction of the Ukrainian Ambassador to London, we met the Vice-President of the Ukrainian State Broadcasting Company, which will broadcast *For The Love Of Tomorrow* in Russian on national television.

NATIONAL HOPE IN THE CITIES COALITION

The newsletter of the National Hope in the Cities Coalition tells of many initiatives flowing from last year's conference in Richmond. In Chicago the City Council passed a resolution which called the Richmond conference 'a message for the whole country'. Earlier Alderman Richard Mell had presented copies of the video *Healing the Heart of America* to the Mayor and all 50 Aldermen. In Richmond momentum grows in the public debate sparked by vice-mayor Larry Chavis' proposal at the conference for a consolidated government, and legislation for this purpose has been debated in the General Assembly.

A team from Black Teens for Advancement (BTA) in Atlanta has visited Florida, where they led discussions in high schools, jails and detention homes, and spoke at an open-air rally and to over 4,000 members of the McGregor Baptist Church. 'If any of you want to bring your message back, contact me,' said Fort Myers' Chief of Police after hearing them. The visit was arranged by Danielle Dennis and her mother Connie, who had met the BTA group at the Richmond conference. In an article in the *News-Press*, Danielle says: 'We all see the problem, we need to do something about it.' In August members of BTA will visit Norway.

DANISH MINISTER TO OPEN BALTIC SEMINAR

On 25 May, the Danish Minister for Nordic and Baltic Affairs will open a 5-day seminar for 40 people from the Baltic Sea region. The seminar's theme is 'Co-operation and Reconciliation - Factors in Building Democracy'. The Danish Government's 'Democracy Fund' has contributed substantially towards the costs of participants from Russia, the Baltic countries and Poland. The seminar will include a visit to the Danish-German border area, where leaders of the German minority in Denmark and the Danish minority south of the border will outline the 1955 'Bonn-Copenhagen Declarations' on the rights of these minorities. This seminar is a continuation of the initiatives aimed at making the Baltic Sea region a pattern of economic and political co-operation based on inter-ethnic and spiritual development.
