




FOREWORD

The other day I met a statesman in his eighties who all his life has fought for the Indian people. He was in despair. 'Our country is possibly the worst in the world,' he declared. 'I do not now trust a single man. All the hopes I had before freedom are shattered. I have raised up many institutions, colleges and schools, but I do not now expect the right ideas to be taught in them.'

Many feel this way. They love India, but they reckon that in free India man has become more crooked.

Whether the national character has slumped since freedom or not is something historians will assess. What is definite to me is that without a total change in the character of leaders and led our country will soon face anarchy and slavery.

This change, glory be to God, is coming. Thousands of college and school students in all parts of India are bringing it about. These youth have decided that they will place themselves in front of the tide of corruption and hate and will fight to roll it back. They have found the strength to do so by tackling cheating, stealing, impurity and hate in their own lives. The contributors to this book are some of them.

The rise of this new army of young men and women is an extraordinary story. It started with the March on Wheels across India in October last year, when about 100 people travelled in buses from Kanya Kumari to Delhi, covering nearly 5,000 miles and scores of towns and villages. The masses responded eagerly to the idea of a national clean-up. Soon the enthusiasm grew into solid action and a number of college and school students in Delhi took practical steps to clean up their lives. They returned stolen books to libraries, articles to shops, and got honest about cheating in exams with teachers and professors.

They produced a play *Badalti Tasweeren* which portrayed bluntly the deteriorating health of the nation and the determination of the students to restore it.

The revolution, because that is precisely what it was, soon spread to many colleges and schools of Bombay. Two hundred Bombay students held a rally against corruption and division on Chowpatty Sands. 75,000 came to this rally and heard 43 of the students speak in clear terms of their decision to become responsible leaders for a new India. Then the Bombay students produced two plays with the same challenge.

With amazing speed the new spirit captured the students of Poona, Hyderabad and Bangalore. With costly yet simple acts of restitution and honesty and with plays and meetings and rallies they too proclaimed to the nation their fight to halt the slide to decadence.

In Madras the prophets of cynicism got a sound licking when hundreds of students shocked the city and state with restitution to schools, colleges, homes, shops, the railways and the government. Lakhs of newspaper readers, tired of the daily dose of hopelessness, were refreshed by the story of 52 students marching up to the Southern Railway office and refunding money they owed for ticketless travel. Shortly afterwards, 133 students from 28 colleges and schools hurled an attack at those who said India would never change with a hard-hitting play Down with Cynicism! And when hundreds of them organised a rally against corruption and hypocrisy, the masses showed their support by mustering in tens of thousands on the Triplicane Beach. Again the press, Tamil and English, took the news of this unusual and faith-giving demonstration to the millions.

I have had the privilege of knowing and working with these students. To me they are part of a gold mine all across and up and down India. Wherever we dig, we shall strike this gold. Let the politicians, the industrialists, the labour leaders and the prominent men and women of our land make no mistake. The passion in these young hearts is strong and clear. They are more

eager for a national clean-up than their fathers and forefathers were for national freedom.

These men and women will fight strictly without violence but definitely with determination. Their greatest asset is the fact that they have broken their pride and faced their mistakes and weaknesses squarely and have put them right. They are not perfect. Some of them are less secure and firm in their commitment than others and still depend on the encouragement and faith of those around them. But they are growing fast in their independent faith and courage. And I for one expect these sons and daughters of India to lead a national upsurge to avert the impending disorder.

These youth of India are worth far more than all the treasure of the world. Will they multiply themselves into an army of ten thousand? An army in which everyone is able to say, 'I fight fearlessly and daily to remake the world. I will put God and truth and country before any other consideration. I will not be bullied by the threats of the world's strongest tyrant. I will live and be ready to die to establish God's kingdom?'

If they do this, India will become the world's greatest country. She will then not only bring a cure to this broken, dying world, but will lead humanity into a new age where everyone has enough for all his needs.




RIGHT IS RIGHT COME WHAT MAY


A basic education should be provided for all after which a technical education can be given according to the aptitude of the student. The villagers and farmers should be taught the better methods of cultivation.




If we Indians work hard, India, free from strife, shall march forward, showing the world that a nation can progress rapidly, if it has the right principles and the right ideas.

DELHI YOUTH SET PACE

A REVOLUTION OF CHARACTER has broken out in the colleges and schools of Delhi. On New Year's Eve Rajmohan Gandhi reporting to Home Minister G. L. Nanda and the voluntary organisations he had called to deal with corruption in the country, told of the revolutionary action the students had already taken.

Gandhi informed the Home Minister of at least 100 students in Delhi who, in the last three weeks, had: (a) Returned money to the Delhi Transport Undertaking for ticketless travel; (b) Returned money to the Cottage Industries for stealing scarves, sweaters and other articles; (c) Returned stolen money to parents and uncles; (d) Returned books to libraries; (e) Been honest with their teachers, professors and principals about cheating, and stated their decision to stop reading pornographic literature. An insurance agent, he said, is paying back his manager in instalments Rs. 1,400 he had embezzled. The manager decided not to accept a bribe to cover up a Rs. 25,000 embezzlement.

Continuing, Gandhi said, 'It is as futile to expect committees to deal with nation-wide corruption as it would have been to expect a committee for national independence to liberate our country 30 years ago.'

Gandhi then proposed an immediate bold plan to get the prominent men of the land to do what these young men and women of Delhi have already done.

— A hundred businessmen to get honest about tax evasion. He suggested that the Rotary and Lion's Clubs might well undertake to find these 100 businessmen.

- A hundred government servants to get honest about bribes and giving favours to relatives and friends.
- A hundred politicians to get honest about false returns of election expenses.

Gandhi also proposed that Delhi youth who had decided to end corruption in their lives and to help end it in the nation be asked to broadcast their decisions over All-India Radio and that a documentary film be made by the government about these young men and women and their simple experiences of honesty, change and a rediscovery of patriotism. This film could then be shown in all the cinema houses of India.

Delhi youth, not waiting for the Government's reply, moved quickly ahead with the play they were writing. It dramatizes how the nation can be cleaned up. The creative ability of dozens of young people was put to work. In less than two weeks they conceived, wrote and produced in Hindi a new play, 'Badalti Tasveeren'.

On January 8 in the auditorium of the Institute of Public Administration the youth's first weapon to prevent India sliding into dictatorship of the left or the right was fired. The cast of 45 young students from 10 colleges and schools were loudly cheered and applauded by an enthusiastic audience.

The play deals deftly and boldly with corruption, poverty, caste and class evils that are hampering the progress of India. Performed with Sitars, Tablas, village scenes, traditional dances and massed chorus singing, the cast gave a mature presentation.

The author of the play, Miss Sarah Kureishy, of Lady Hardinge Medical College, speaking after the performance said, 'What you have seen on the stage tonight could be happening in your home, factory or village. It is up to you to attack corruption in the land.' A student from the School of Architecture, Mr. Sabarwal, said, 'We in the cast pledged our lives to build a new India with clean hands and pure hearts.'

"IT IS UP TO US NOW"

Bombay Youth Speak

N BOMBAY the students of the city's colleges and schools with Rajmohan Gandhi called a mass rally on Chowpatty sands, which was attended by 75,000 men and women. The students marched in three great processions carrying their college and school emblems, shouting slogans and led by bands through the city's streets. Two hundred massed the platform and 43 of them, one after another, marched to the microphone to announce their determination to assume responsibility for changing India.

'Our greatest enemy is not aggression from without, but disintegration from within,' said an Elphinstone College girl. 'We, the youth of India, have decided to end this disintegration.'

A girl from Bombay's leading medical college, said, 'The fact that the people of Bombay have come in such large numbers shows that this is the common man's revolution.' Sudhir Bhatt of Wilson College said, 'If Mahatma Gandhi were alive today he would rejoice that at last a resolute body of young men and women have taken on his unfinished task.'

Earlier, the Bombay youth opened their public attack on corruption and hypocrisy with the production and premiere performance of 'Nayi Lahar' ('New Wave'), a blunt portrayal of Indian society today. Before a packed audience the cast of 100 challenged all Bombay citizens to join with them in the struggle they had undertaken. The play ranges from the palatial dwellings of the wealthy to the grimy pavements and market places of the poor. It deals with extreme selfishness and extreme hate and shows the way to build a new society without violence.

The Sunday Standard headlined their story, 'Reformation in a Flood' The following is the letter they presented to the General Manager.

General Manager,

March 21, 1964

Southern Railway, Madras.

Dear Sir:

We, the following students of Madras, sincerely apologise for having travelled ticketless in trains. We wish to make up the loss by returning the money to you today. We assure you that we will not repeat this in the future. This change was brought in us by the urge to fight for our nation.

We are schoolboys against corruption. The idea of doing this is so that if we return the money for travelling ticketless, all the others, young and old, would stop cheating the government.

We decided to do this after attending a few meetings of Moral Re-Armament which taught us to listen to our inner voice.

Unless we put an end to these small mistakes, we cannot put an end to unemployment, poverty and corruption in our nation. We have decided to continue this fight for the nation throughout our lives.

By doing this in India we hope to spread the idea of Moral Re-Armament throughout the world.

A similar letter was presented to the Director of State Transport, Madras, by another group of students for travelling ticketless on the buses. On the 26th of April the students of Madras organized a mass rally estimated at 20,000. The event was widely covered by the press. The Indian Express reported as follows:

YOUTH DECLARES WAR ON CORRUPTION

ORTY-FIVE STUDENTS of city colleges, at a mass rally at Triplicane Beach this evening, pledged themselves to ending corruption.

They called upon the elders to join them in the war on corruption and help in building up a strong, united and clean India.

At the meeting, attended also by parents and the general public, student after student got up and related how he or she had ended corruption in his or her own life by giving up cheating in examinations, travelling without tickets in trains and buses etc.

Only people with clean hands could clean up public life, they said. They wanted the leaders to be guided by God and not by men or women. They asked industrialists to give fair wages to workers and pay up taxes they had evaded.

Mr. V. C. Viswanathan, former president of the Student Council of city colleges, said that students were determined to end corruption in the country and Madras students were pioneers in this struggle.

MRA leaders from Norway, Japan and America also addressed the rally which was presided over by Miss Susan Oomen, student of the Women's Christian College.

POLITICIANS MUST CHANGE OR STEP ASIDE

B ANGALORE YOUTH BY THEIR thousands responded to a challenge with the same enthusiasm and determination as have the youth of Delhi and Bombay during the last few months. What is it that has stirred their passions? A final year medical student, chairing the mass meeting in Bangalore, said: 'We are going to produce a group of young men and women who will not rest until this nation changes. We will work 24 hours a day until it comes to its senses and is built up on the sure foundation of absolute moral standards. We, the youth, having cleaned our own hands, now tell politicians, "You must change or step aside".'

What has sparked off this revolution which is so rapidly gaining momentum up and down the country? It is the patriotism of a group of young men led by Gandhiji's grandson, Rajmohan Gandhi, who are convinced that India's internal disease is as deadly as the danger from China. 'It lies in jealousy, impurity, hate and fear,' says Gandhi. 'These have produced division, bribery, drift and frustration. Unchecked, they will lead inevitably to anarchy and dictatorship.'

They believe that Governments that do not go to the root of the problem in the nation—human nature—do not do so because they have not gone to the root of their own problems. Men have to choose between living for their nation or living for themselves. Gandhi is calling on youth, and all men, to choose to live for their nation; and youth are responding in a big way.

This is a universal idea. It means revolution for Delhi, Peking, Moscow, London, Washington—for all men everywhere.

Gandhi's immediate objective is to raise a force of 10,000 dedicated workers to take this idea to every village in the land. The first 2,000 are being enlisted now. They will undergo training for two months during the summer vacation.

Those whose vested interest is in the future of their country and of humanity feel their hearts beat faster when truth is proclaimed and a call to action given. The youth of Bengal are needed in this revolution along with those from Delhi, Bombay, Madras. No longer do you have to wait, this is a call to action now.

YOUNG INDIANS DEMAND CHANGE


R. D. MATHUR, one of the founders of the United Nations' Student Organisation of India, speaking in a public meeting in Delhi, declared, 'The people of India will no longer tolerate the drift, apathy and corruption in the country. There is going to be revolution. Mere promises of commissions investigating corruption and better administration in the future will not satisfy the people.' Young men will continue to speak out, but with clean hands and free from corruption in their own lives. 'We are demanding immediate action', said Mathur.

V. C. Viswanathan, formerly the head of the students in Madras, said, 'There must come a social and economic revolution that answers every injustice.'

He called for a crash programme of Moral Re-Armament training for every Government Civil Servant. He attacked the wastage in Government and industry through sloppy workmanship, work hours lost through idleness and chasing applications through Government offices, and needless class-war stoppages. There must be a time limit set for every job done and every application made. 'We young men and women,' he said, 'are out to make India the most dynamic nation in Asia.'

Dev Dutt, cricket captain of the Agra Medical College, said, 'We must cure not only the disease of a patient but the disease of the nation. Five dramas have been written and produced by the youth of Delhi, Bombay, Hyderabad, and Madras, as weapons in the national clean-up struggle.


