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DR. NICOL ADDRESSES WORLD ASSEMBLY FOR MORAL REARMAMENT

CAUX (Switzerland), Thursday.

P. WILLIAM NICOL, Administrator of the Transvaal, speaking at the World Assembly for Moral Rearmament here, referred to the deep-rooted differences of colour and of standpoint in South Africa.

Accompanying Dr. Nicol are four members of the Executive Committee of the Transvaal in-

cluding Dr. Wasenaar, leader of the Nationalists in the Provincial

Council who, addressing the assembly of 1,200 delegates, sai "We are very grateful to have had the opportunity to be her in Caux. Here we have see a world of diversity in unity and we have seen unity in diversity. We have just heard that

everything has got to change, and that is true. This is the hope for a new and better world."

He recalled that Paul Kruger's last home was at Clarens—which can be seen from Caux—and he thanked the Swiss people for the way they had cared for the old President in the last years of his

life.

Speaking subsequently to Press representatives, Dr. Nicol said he was convinced that Caux had the solution for the present-day problem of the world. A common loyalty to an overarching ideology was being put into practice and that appeared to be the reply to division, strife and materialism.

COMMON COMMAND "We are all at sixes and sevens

with one another because in our endeavours to serve we are being guided by mutually antagonistic motives. Caux shows the way. The modern theocracy offers freedom for all, but under a common command. Democracy can be maintained, but only when that way of life is inspired and guided by God. The voice, which has already been accepted as final and authoritative by tens of thousands, must still find acceptance among the teeming millions of every nation and must eventually resound with unchallenged authority in the council chambers and parliaments of mankind.

"It may still be a long road. It is sure to be a hard road, but it is a good road. It is the right road."
