A COSMOPOLITAN audience of about 800 attended the opening session of the Moral Rearmament conference at the Harry Margolis Hall in Salisbury last night.
On stage were some of the 150 delegates from other countries and many prominent Rhodesians, including politicians and churchmen.
Cabinet Ministers and Senators, including the Deputy Prime Minister, Senator John Wrathall, also attended the meeting and heard Dr Elliott Gabellah, vice-president of the African National Council, and Mr Alec Smith, son of the Prime Minister, Mr Ian Smith.
The Mayor of Salisbury, Clir Tony Tanser, opened the conference and said it was the most cosmopolitan assembly he had ever addressed.

The Anglican Bishop of Mashonaland, the Rt Rev. Paul Burrough, told members of the audience that they had come to the conference at their peril. They had to accept the terrifying logic of the love of God and live up to it. Mr Alec Smith said it was because he was a Rho-desian and loved his country that he was seeking a solution to its problems. If God's plan was accepted the problems of race hatred and injustice would be solved. The conference continues until Sunday with morn-ing sessions at the Uni-versity of Rhodesia.
