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'GLIMMER OF HOPE' FOR SOMALIA

Following the Uppsala Seminar on Somalia last January and the opportunity Caux afforded for responsible Somalis to confer, there have been further steps in building a united leadership. Farouk Mawlawi, the UN Department of Public Information Director who accredited MRA as an NGO, served a year in Somalia as UN spokesman prior to his recent retirement. In December he arranged a meeting for Professor Galayd of Syracuse University, a former Somali Minister of Industry, to meet with Assistant Secretary General for Political Affairs, Linsane Kouyati. This led to a two-hour conference, arranged by Ambassador Kouyati, with the six top UN experts on Somalia to meet Professor Galayd, Mrs Nurta H Hassan and Mr Osman Jama, who had served 18 years as a Somali Cabinet Minister. At a UN-hosted luncheon which followed, one official remarked that what the Somalis said was the first glimmer of hope they had had. The three Somalis later had a similar time with senior officials of the State Department in Washington.

'ACTION OUT OF SILENCE'

We were in Moscow for two weeks in November, teaming up with Philip and Vendela Tyndale-Biscoe who were there on a three-month language course.

Our main aim was to meet the 17 Muscovites who were in Caux last summer, and to see other friends. We were the guests of Judge Ernest Ametistov of Russia's Constitutional (Supreme) Court and his law professor wife, Olga, who had been in Caux for the European session.

Some of our friends had been busy reporting on their Caux visits. Philosopher Grigori Pomerants, who with his wife attended the 'Regions in Crisis' session, had written a superb three-page account of their time in the weekly magazine *New Times*. Headlined 'Action out of Silence', it shows great insight into MRA and the ways of Caux. In 1948 *New Times* was the first Soviet publication to carry an article on MRA. At that time it was not so complimentary.

The basic text of the seminar Professor Pomerants gave at Caux was carried in two other publications. Radio Russia interviewed him and his wife for 40

minutes in a programme entitled 'Faith', which in turn led to an interview with Leif. Retired *Novosti* writer Eduard Rozental had articles on Caux in the newspaper *Russia* and in *Ronika*, a new publication for Russia's emerging business sector.

Also in Caux this summer was Sergei Kovalov who had spent seven years in the Gulag. He has since been appointed Human Rights Ombudsman of Russia. Viacheslav Igrunov (Caux 1992) is now deputy chair of the Russian Parliament's inter-ethnic committee which deals with relations with the Baltic States and Ukraine. He expressed gratitude for MRA's helpful role and hopes that Caux might help in the healing of some of these difficult relationships.

We also met younger Russians working to rejuvenate the Orthodox Church. We hope that some of them will get to Caux next summer.

There is much to be concerned about in Russia still but the conviction of many Russians gave us hope. Grigori Pomerants wrote in one of his articles, 'We need a moral renewal. Everyone of us needs moral re-armament. Everyone needs a change from the inside. There is no other way to survive than through a moral and spiritual renaissance.'

'INTRODUCING MORAL AUTHORITY'

'Seeking a national life based on moral values' was the theme of the 18th international MRA action in October in Odawara, Tokyo and Kobe. It was inaugurated by Professor Matsuoka of Kanagawa University, who said that 'moral wars waged by the common people' were needed, rather than military or economic ones.

At a public symposium in Odawara, co-hosted by the Asia Center Odawara and the National Institute for Research Advancement (NIRA), Sam Rainsy, then Cambodian Minister of Finance, stressed that his country needed the power of law, transparency and accountability rather than the power of the gun and money. With him was his wife, Tioulong-Saumura Sam, Deputy Governor of Cambodia's Central Bank.

Masahide Shibusawa, a representative of the Odawara Center, expressed MRA's strategy as 'an attempt to change the framework of confrontation by introducing moral authority.' When a conflict is intensified, he said, neither side can afford to concede even a little. 'If you create a formula under which both sides concede to a higher moral authority, solutions become possible.' MRA had played a vital role in post-war Japan, he said. 'But while at Caux reconciliation with the French was seen as a prerequisite for Germany's survival, the Japanese delegations to Mackinac and Caux had little contact with other Asians. When it comes to spiritual regret, there is no doubt we lag behind Germany. As one who was involved, I feel overwhelmed with shame.' Introducing the new book Religion: the Missing Dimension of Statecraft, he expressed his gratitude that MRA's historic involvements have begun to be rightly evaluated. 'The Caux 50th will be an opportunity to re-evaluate the fruits. I hope that a blueprint for new activities across the world will be produced,' he concluded.

At a public symposium on the theme of cleaning up politics, panelists included Yukika Sohma, former Senator Shidzue Kato (now 97), Chairman Kaku of Canon, Rainsy and Tioulong-Saumura Sam, Liu Ren-Jou from Taiwan and leading Japanese political commentator, Masayuki Fukuoka.

UKRAINIAN PARLIAMENTARIANS VISIT BRITAIN

Ten Ukrainian parliamentarians visited Britain for two weeks in November for a seminar, 'Making Democracy Work', arranged by MRA's *Foundations for Freedom* programme. A full report is available. The event gave us some remarkable touches in British public life. It also brought the wholehearted support of the British Embassy in Kiev, without which the visit would never have happened. The full budget was covered by the Westminster Foundation for Democracy, whose funds come from the British government.

The relationships with the Ukrainian visitors were warm and can be developed on future visits to Kiev. The group, cross-party as it was, was very polarised on arrival. There was a marked change in atmosphere among them during the fortnight. As one of them remarked at the end, 'A united Ukraine will be the best guarantee of our security.' Ukraine is at a decisive stage of its development and prayerful wisdom is needed on how to follow up on this event.

Regarding the FFF programme as a whole, we are deeply grateful to the 85 individuals, trusts and companies which have given the almost £47,000 needed to cover this year's programme. A 16-page report '94/prospectus '95 will be available by the end of January.
