Moral Re-armament

To the Editor of The Star

SIR,—I would like to take this opportunity of thanking you for the recent publicity given by your paper to the achievements of Moral Re-armament in bringing unity to a divided world, in the homes, industry and between races.

Such constructive news of an answer to the present chaos is a pleasant relief from the negative picture one so often sees in the Press today.

I have attended M.R.A. meetings in India, along with Muslims, Hindus and British, to plan for unity in that continent, while outside in the streets Muslims were fighting Hindus and the general cry was "out with the British" at that time.

Likewise, I have worked with a team of Karens and Burmese to bring the answer to communal strife in Burma.

While in Malaya I saw how a certain Chinese schoolteacher, trained in Moral Re-armament, and who later was elected to membership of the Singapore Legislative Council, brought together the leaders of the Malay and Chinese communities at a critical time.

This resulted in the Chinese calling off a boycott they had planned against the Federal Government created in 1948. According to the GovernorGeneral the country was thereby saved from a potential civil war.
