

Sebe wants end to fear

CAUX. — Mr Lennox Sebe one of the four South African homeland Chief Ministers attending the Moral Re-Armament World assembly in Caux, Switzerland, has called for a common aim to unite all races, above suspicion, fear and bitterness.

Mr Sebe, of the Ciskei, said: "You can feel boiling bitterness. It comes easily when you find that the other man is clinging to the privileges he must share. Change in ourselves is the first step towards better relations."

He called for "a common goal, towards which we can all work together, without suspicion, fear or bitterness".

Speaking of recent events in the Eastern Mediterranean, Mr Sebe said: "The world needs a new statesmanship to end confusion. People have their own ideas, and are prone to push them on others."

"We lack a mighty positive programme which will unite all men and nations."

Many problems were created by those determined to cling to power, even at the cost of lives and bloodshed,

he said, and some schemes added nothing to the solution of the problems.

He asked why trained men, experts in their fields, often failed to resolve conflicts.

"They lack the humanising factor that would make a common ground for all," he said.

"There is a new statesmanship in Caux. This conference gives a great positive answer to the problems of the world."

He evoked a future for the homelands where empty hands would be filled with

work, empty stomachs with food and empty hearts with an idea that really satisfied where riches and resources would be shared for the benefit of all, regardless of colour.

"Who will put the key into the lock of history and open the gates of the future to all?" he challenged.

Also taking part in the international parliamentary session are Chief Lucas Mangope of Bophutha Tswana, Prof. Hudson Ntsanwisi of Phatudi of Gazankulu and Dr Cedric Phatudi of Lebowa.
