

'White youth changing'

TWO South African Blacks were among an international Moral Re-Armament team of 25 who left for Rhodesia at the weekend after spending two months in South Africa.

They were: Miss Bulie Ndamse, 26, daughter of the late Transkei Minister of Education; Mr Curnick Ndamse and Mr Samuel Pono, 33, a musician and

former member of the banned PAC.

Both had been working full-time for Moral Re-Armament in Europe before returning to their home country with the team. Both were struck by a change of attitude among White South African youth on their return.

Young Whites' recognition of the fear and selfishness

among White South Africans and the need for change is what struck Miss Ndamse and Mr Pono, the only two Black members of the team which toured South Africa.

They were invited to Rhodesia by both Alec Smith, son of the Rhodesian premier, and by the Reverend Arthur Kano-dereka, treasurer of the Muzorewa wing of the ANC.
