YOUNG FOLK ON A MISSION TO FIND SOLUTION FOR S. AFRICA

A GROUP of 25 young men and women from 12 different countries and touring Southern Africa for the world Moral Re-armament force, would soon be interviewing various Transkei personalities including, it is hoped, cabinet members.

Mr John Schroeder, speaking here for Moral Re-armament, said the group, mostly of students and young people, were in Rhodesia and had recently talked to black and white leaders in Natal. They would be in Transkei in about six weeks' time.

"During their visit to the Transvaal it was significant that the people of Soweto lent the group one of their four mini-buses now being used for the tour. Everybody has helped the group since its arrival," Mr Schroeder said.

The mobile force has been moving in Southern Africa for three or four months. Members had been invited here by a delegation of English, Afrikaans and black South Africans at a conference in Switzerland at the end of last year.

"Their motive in coming here is to share with people of all races that they have found that true

security and peace come from obedience to God.

"They want to learn from South Africa and find together with young

and old a way forward in South Africa, and also what South Africa can give to the world," Mr Schoeder said.
