

Bring "great" MRA to Africa, says Vundla

Rand leader's call in U. S.

NO PRICE "is too high to bring Moral Re-Armament to Africa now," Mr. P. Q. Vundla, chairman of Western Native Township Advisory Board, told a conference in America.

Mr. Vundla was one of ten delegates from African nations who attended the Summit Strategy Conference of Moral Re-Armament in Michigan.

One of the main objects of the conference was to "realise the recent call of Dr. Nnamdi Azikiwe, father of West African nationalism, to create a hate-free, fear-free, greed-free continent, peopled by free men and women."

Mr. Vundla was described at the conference as "a man who led tram and bus boycotts and whose life has been in danger on several occasions because of his convictions."

He said that MRA was a "great move to fight for a new world, openly above board without fear and in the right way.

"We need Americans", he said, who will take up this fight to make MRA the national policy of their country.

"If America does this the whole world will follow suit."

World will follow

Several white South Africans also attended the conference. Among them were Dr. James van Rensburg of East London and Mr Nico Ferreira, a Nationalist youth leader.

Both pledged themselves "to live for the fulfilment of Dr. Azikiwe's vision."
