

Conrad Hunte—the perfect cricketer

Conrad Hunte who was the guest speaker at the Sports-Star-Of-the-Year banquet is a world famous cricketer and an active leader in the Moral Re-

Armament movement.

An aggressive batsman, Hunte was vice-captain of the West Indies cricket team during the '60's. It was largely due to his skill

that they established themselves as world champions in 1964 and 1965.

RELATIONS

In 1965 he was awarded the Kari Nunes Trophy in

Australia "for the player who has done most on and off the field to foster better relations between Australia and the West Indies".

TALENT

He retired from cricket in 1967 and after writing his autobiography, "Playing to Win", he devoted himself to Moral-Re-Armament — an interest he developed after seeing the film, "The Crowning Experience" based on the life of the negro educator, Dr Mary McLeod Bethune. He decided then to use his cricketing talent, "to bringing nations closer together."

SOBERS

Hunte who comes from the country that produced greats like the legendary Sir Garfield (Gary) Sobers and Wes Hall, is very much in favour of the return of South Africa to the world cricket arena.
