

# *Non-Whites to say 'terror aid wrong'*

A PARTY of Coloured and African leaders from South Africa is going to England on Sunday to tell British trade unionists that the British Labour movement is mistaken in giving money to African guerrillas.

"We believe the Blacks are the only South Africans who can effectively say this," the members of the group say.

"We shall tell the British trade unionists that it is better to work with people than to liquidate them."

The party will include Mr Tom Swartz, chairman of the Coloured People's Representative Council; Dr W. F. Nkomo of Pretoria; the headmasters of two Coloured schools, Messrs Pat and Franklin Sonn; a Reef businessman, Mr Jacob Mohlala; Messrs Khanyile, Tsetlo and Mahlangu, headmasters of East Rand schools; Messrs Nkoane and Phatswane, headmasters of Soweto schools; Mr Miyen, head of a school at Elim; Mr Sigcu, head of a school in Umtata;

Messrs Mpepuka and Thethe, vice-principals of East Rand schools; and Mr Ncoqazi, an East Rand teacher.

Mr C. M. C. Ndamse, Minister of Roads and works in the Transkei Government, has been prevented from accompanying the party.

Nine members of the party form the cast of a play called *The Dictator's Slippers*, by Peter Howard, which they will present in London, Belfast, Dublin and finally in Caux, Switzerland.

## MORAL REARMAMENT

There the cast, together with the other members of the party, will comprise this country's fully interracial delegation to the 25th anniversary assembly of the Moral Rearmament Movement.

They have already put on the play in Umtata, at the Zulu University at Ngoya, and privately in Johannesburg.

Dr Nkomo says: "We are going to represent South Africa as it cannot be represented in any other way. Whenever I

have stood, overseas, with integrated groups from this country we have been able to make an impact."
